NOMINATIONS INVITED FOR THE 2015 DANIEL S. LEHRMAN LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD IN BEHAVIORAL NEUROENDOCRINOLOGY

The Society for Behavioral Neuroendocrinology honors one of its members with the Daniel S. Lehrman Lifetime Achievement Award. The award serves three important purposes:

1. To honor the lifetime achievements of distinguished investigators in our field.
2. To educate junior members of SBN about the life and work of distinguished senior members.
3. To create an opportunity for publication education and outreach by highlighting the contributions of a distinguished member

The award honors individuals who have a sustained record of significant original research, distinguished scholarship, and effective mentorship in any field of behavioral neuroendocrinology.

Nominators should simply provide a nomination letter and a current copy of the nominee's curriculum vitae.

RESEARCH EXPERIENCE FOR UNDERGRADUATES

RESEARCH EXPERIENCE FOR UNDERGRADUATES (REU) IN THE INTEGRATIVE BIOLOGY OF SOCIAL BEHAVIORS

Michigan State University is accepting applications for a National Science Foundation-funded summer program. The Integrative Biology of Social Behaviors is a 10-week summer program that will run from May 17 through July 25, 2015. In 2015, we will be accepting at least 9 students. Student participants from other universities will receive free room and board, round-trip travel expenses to Michigan State University for the program and a \$5,000 stipend for the summer.

Participating students will receive hands-on research experience studying a wide range of model organisms (mammals, fish, insects and digital organisms) over many levels of organization (molecules, cells, individuals and populations). Students will also benefit from a weekly journal club and from participating in modules on research ethics, statistics, applying to graduate school and careers in the biological sciences. At the end of the program, students will present their summer activities at a university-wide undergraduate research symposium.

Students entering their junior or senior year in Fall 2015 at any U.S. college or university are eligible. Applicants should have a background in animal behavior and/or biology and should be majoring in a relevant discipline. No previous research experience is required. Applications from women and members of underrepresented groups, including people with disabilities, are especially encouraged.
